



## Holy Week

Holy Week is the most solemn week in Christianity, commemorating the final week of Our Lord's life and celebrating the Passover from his death to the Resurrection. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday (celebrating Jesus' triumphant entrance into Jerusalem) and culminates with Easter, which begins at dark on Holy Saturday at the Easter Vigil and is celebrated with Masses continuing on Easter Sunday, the octave of Easter and continuing for 50 days until the celebration of Pentecost.

Sundown on Holy Thursday draws an end to Lent and leads us into the three-day liturgy which is called the *Paschal or Sacred Triduum*, from the Latin word for “three” + *dies* (“day”). Basically, the Sacred Triduum is one great festival recounting Jesus' Passion, Death and Resurrection, when the Lamb of God laid down his life in atonement for our sins. The Easter Vigil is traditionally a celebration of newly baptized and fully initiated members of the church who receive the sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation) in the sacred vigil of the Lord's Resurrection and triumph over sin and death.

The "Paschal Mystery" is the ultimate fulfillment of the ancient Jewish Passover (or Pasch), which itself was a recollection of how God brought the Jews out of slavery in Egypt. The spotless lamb was slaughtered at the Passover meal and consumed—that same night the destroying angel "passed over" the homes marked with the blood of the Passover Lamb, and those covered by the Blood were saved. This was the Old Testament prefiguration of Jesus' work at the Last Supper—where he made himself as the Paschal Lamb—and Calvary, where the sacrifice was offered to save us from our slavery to sin. With the Eucharist, we receive the victim, the spotless lamb that died for our salvation, one marvelous event celebrated over three days.



### **TODAY'S READINGS**

**First Reading** — The LORD does something new for the chosen people (Isaiah 43:16-21)

**Psalm** — The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy (Psalm 126)

**Second Reading** — The supreme good is knowing Jesus as Lord (Philippians 3:8-14)

**Gospel** — A woman caught in the act of adultery is brought to Jesus. He challenges anyone without sin to throw the first stone (John 8:1-11)

### **SOMETHING NEW IN CHRIST**

Jesus knew that the scribes and Pharisees were trying to trap him. They put him in what seemed to be a no-win situation. Let the woman who was caught in adultery go, and he would have been accused of ignoring the law. Let her be stoned, and he would fail to show mercy toward her, contradicting his life's message. Jesus' response teaches three crucial lessons: none of us is free of sin; we are not the ultimate judges of others; Jesus is the mercy of God, in whom we can always trust. In Christ, God does something new. When we give our hearts to Christ, we have the hope of new life, a life in which mercy reigns.

Buy an extra ticket for a meal to give away

Reflect on what you appreciate about another. Write a note, card, tell them

Fast from bad news; feed on prayer  
Fast from discontent; feed on gratitude

Practice silence / active listening  
Spend day without judging others  
Avoid bickering, arguing, criticizing  
Fast from Gossip
